Genealogy Research in Washington DC - From the Archives, and Library of Congress, to a myriad other resources, our capital is a treasure trove for researching your ancestry. (Mike Strauss, PG)

Bringing History Home: A Case Study in Internet Research Techniques - Follow Katie as she explores the resources available online that help to uncover the remarkable history of a 19th century home in Charlottesville. She traces the history of the land and its owners and then the home and its occupants and gives insight into what is possible to reconstruct using only free online sources. (Katie Derby, FHL)

Researching the African-Americans at Monticello during Levy Ownership – The Levy family of New York owned Monticello from the 1830s to 1920s. Starting with family knowledge of the farm manager family but not the African-Americans, Sam will go over the sources of information he used in researching the African-Americans at Monticello during the Levy ownership. The emphasis will be on the pre and post civil war era. (Sam Towler, CVGA)

Sharing Family History and Genealogy Information - Sharing your research with others is a great way to connect with lost relatives, tap into the fruits of the efforts of others, and reduce duplication of effort. We'll look at several ways of getting your research out there for others to use. We'll also examine ways to meaningfully share what you've found with your family. (Norm Carlson, FHL)

DNA and Genealogy Research - This class will answer basic questions about DNA and its current and possible contributions to genealogy work. Topics to be discussed are: What is DNA? How is it used to identify individuals? How can it be used to find my ancestors? What options are currently available to use DNA in genealogy? What is the potential for DNA and genealogy?
