Adding Information— Family, Pedigree, Individual

- **Names**

- Type full name Mary Jane Smith (maiden)
- Titles, nicknames-fields on individual screen.
Only exception is “Mrs.”. When wife name is unknown, list as Mrs. John Taylor.
Can go back and change later.
- Infants, children w/unknown death date, type one of following in death date field.
 - Chi or Child
 - Sti or Stillborn
 - Inf or Infant

Adding Information - cont.

- **Places**

- Type out full place names.
- Example:
Charlottesville,
Albemarle, Virginia,
USA.
- If all places are not known, place a comma where the missing place would be.



Making Changes

- As simple as word processor
- Symbols on Family Screen
 - Can be viewed in Help File in PAF under view symbols.
 - Symbols—Chalkboard and in PAF
 - Notes—
 - Multimedia—
 - * on birth and death dates means christening or burial dates are being used.

Family Search lessons

- Note symbols-Item #2
 - (!) place in note to show when printing
 - (~) place in note to hide when printing
 - (~research:) to make notes to self.
- Sources- Items #7-14,
- #15 citation detail (comments, conflicting info, accuracy, etc.)
- #16 creating source (Show Me)

Lesson #3 – Notes & Sources

- **Note—To add multiple sources, add source to individual instead of event. Click Individual Source button.
- To view all sources for one individual, click the yellow open book. To edit go back to source and change.
- Pictures or Documents can be attached to source descriptions, but won't print. To print, attach to the individual.

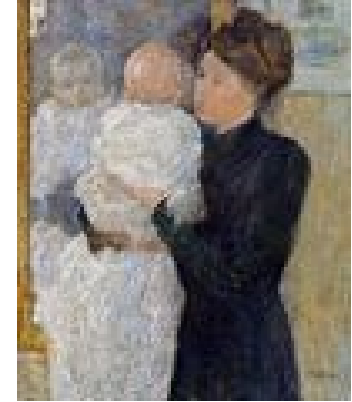
Lesson #4—Printing Forms & Reports

<p>HUSBAND - John DYKES Source of information: Helen Lorraine (Dykes) Wensel, youngest daughter of John.</p> <p>According to Lamar Hammerstein, a resident of Beaver, Ohio, John Dykes was a well respected member of the community. A stone with his name carved in it was placed in the cornerstone of the methodist church in Beaver. He was a well loved school teacher as portrayed by a poem written by one of his former students.</p>	
CHILD 1 - Nellie Edith DYKES	
<p>Of the people who were the most influential in my life, Grandma is at the top of the list. She was a wonderful Grandmother, an avid reader, a good cook, a talented gardener, an expert Scrabble player, a good listener, and knowledgeable about many things. She always kept track of her many grandchildren. We loved to go to her house. She seemed to know what children liked.</p> <p>I remember being told as a child, that she had helped deliver babies in her earlier years and that she had been a school teacher in a one room school house. As an adult in speaking with her sister Billie, I was told that she drove a horse and buggy to school.</p>	
CHILD 5 - Edna Mae DYKES	
<p>Edna wrote a book, Called Living with Cancer. She was 36 years old, a single mother. The year would have been 1944. She had the most malignant form of stomach cancer when science didn't have any answers. She was used as a test for some very strong drugs.</p> <p>She said when she learned that she had cancer and was told she only had six months to live, she died a thousand times. She died of shock and the horror of it, along with the wasting and pain. Her weight dropped from 146 pounds to 90 lbs. while on the treatments. She said, "I died in everything that mattered, but I had a sister who refused to admit it, so I got up and started to live again. With Dorothy's help, she decided to stop taking the treatments. Her sister cooked for her and cared for her and she recuperated when the doctors told her she wouldn't see her next Christmas. She lived for 25 more productive years.</p> <p>In writing her book, Edna hoped that her story would give others the courage to fight their way through what she called the grim darkness of it.</p>
